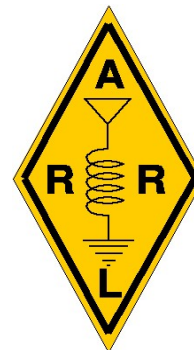

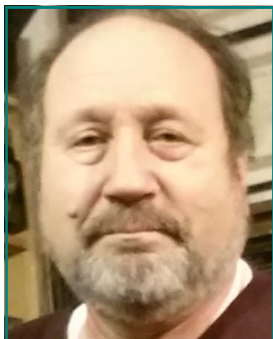

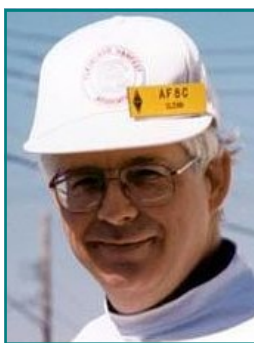

The repeater was reported as being OK although Glenn, AF8C, reported that during Monday night West Park Radiops nets when the weather is both cold and wet, the repeater starts to exhibit a lot of static. Editor Dave, WD8IOU, reports he is working on the next newsletter is always looking for more articles from the membership for the next issue.

Old/New Business:

Ron, K8VJG, opened with the annual request for Field Day funding. For Field Day there is a need for overnight operators due to changes in club membership. Then Dave, WD8IOU, commented on the coming Dayton/Xenia (D/X) Hamvention 2017. Parking used to be \$100 for four spots. The new fee will be \$100 for two spots. Currently tickets can be ordered for \$22 and arrive in the mail in four days.

Tedd discussed the support we gave last month to the upcoming 3Y0Z DXpedition. We had more discussion about that. Our club logo is already on their Web page. Next, Tedd announced the CQ WPX post-contest luncheon is all set for 12:30 p.m. on March 29 at Buffalo Wild Wings. We have a new request for donations to a Bangladesh DXpedition occurring March 15-27. That operation will have the two callsigns, S21GM and S21KW. There will be 12 operators doing 160 through 10 on SSB, CW, and RTTY. All radios will be K3 except for one IC-7300. Antennas will be four-squares and Spiderbeams. Bruce, N8DJX, moved and Ron, K8VJG, seconded a motion to donate \$100 to their activity and the motion passed. S21 is ranked as 56 on the most wanted list.

Letters from DX Engineering offered the club a chance to do a Saturday visit to the showroom and an optional tour of the K3LR station. The second letter offered a chance for a SKYPE-based program on a topic of our choice at our usual meeting site. Joe, N8QXC, offered his opinion that DX Engineering gives a military discount on purchases.

Tedd has a copy of the will for Karl, K8BCK. NODXA has been willed all of Karl's radio equipment and periodicals, with antennas being uncertain, and no computer equipment, no logs and no QSL cards. Some discussion followed about when the club can "start" the disposal processing.

On the next topic, Tedd mentioned the Lake Erie Boat Anchors group meeting occur-

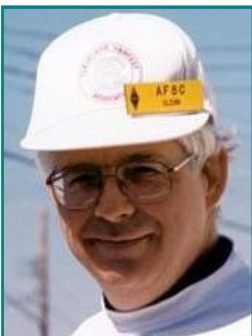
Wrapup:

Mary reported that dues are still coming in. Bruce, N8DJX, moved and Dave, KZ8Y, seconded that the treasurer's report be approved and it was voted and approved. The repeater was reported as being OK. Old/New Business:

Metro, W8MET, has taken over announcing news about the CARS bus to the Dayton Hamvention. Seats were still available as of April 3. Tedd recently called the cousin of Karl, K8BCK, regarding disposition of Karl's amateur radio equipment from his estate. Karl's cousin is not ready to make a move yet. Wayne, K8FF took a picture of the crank-up tower which has two 20 ft. sections.

At the recent DX Luncheon at Buffalo Wild Wings, the attendance was only 12 people, instead of the usual 20 or so. At that luncheon, Tim Duffy, K3LR, says planning for the Hamvention is set up. George, K8KR, says that Tim predicted high attendance at the 2017 Hamvention. Also noted was that an 80 ft. tower will be installed on the Tallmadge, Ohio, grounds of the DX Engineering site. Tedd

announced that the NODXA Day at DX Engineering has been scheduled for Saturday, July 22, at 9 a.m. Following that activity, interested people can go to a tour of the K3LR station in PA. Pete, N8TR, provided a short verbal description of the status of the K3LR site.

The ARRL recently assigned two prefixes (Midway and Kure Islands) to Deleted Entity status, thus moving the minimum Honor Roll count to 328. Per the March meeting, the two donations were sent out last month. Tedd sent a \$750 donation via PayPal to the Bouvet operation this morning and already a certificate from K4UE has arrived back in Tedd's email. Tedd announced receiving a new funding request from J5B/J5W, being a husband and wife team EA3BT and EA3WL. This J5 operation would be an IO-TA location Rubane Island (AF-020), working 40m through 6m and perhaps 80 m. See Tedd's OPDX Bulletin 1308 for more details.

Next month the Hamvention NODXA hospitality suite funding will be voted. For the annual officer's election (details in the March 6, 2017, minutes) Pete, N8TR, moved to have the officers who were nominated at the March 6 meeting elected as nominated, with the position of vice president unresolved due to lack of a volunteer. Denny, WB8K seconded the motion and the slated was elected by a show of hands. Note that Dwaine, K8ME, had announced his intentional retirement as vice president without any premonition of his own passing.

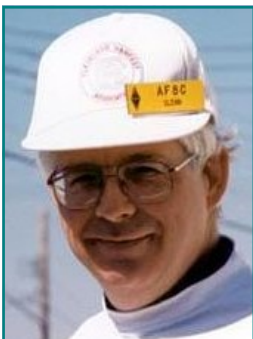
Wrapup:

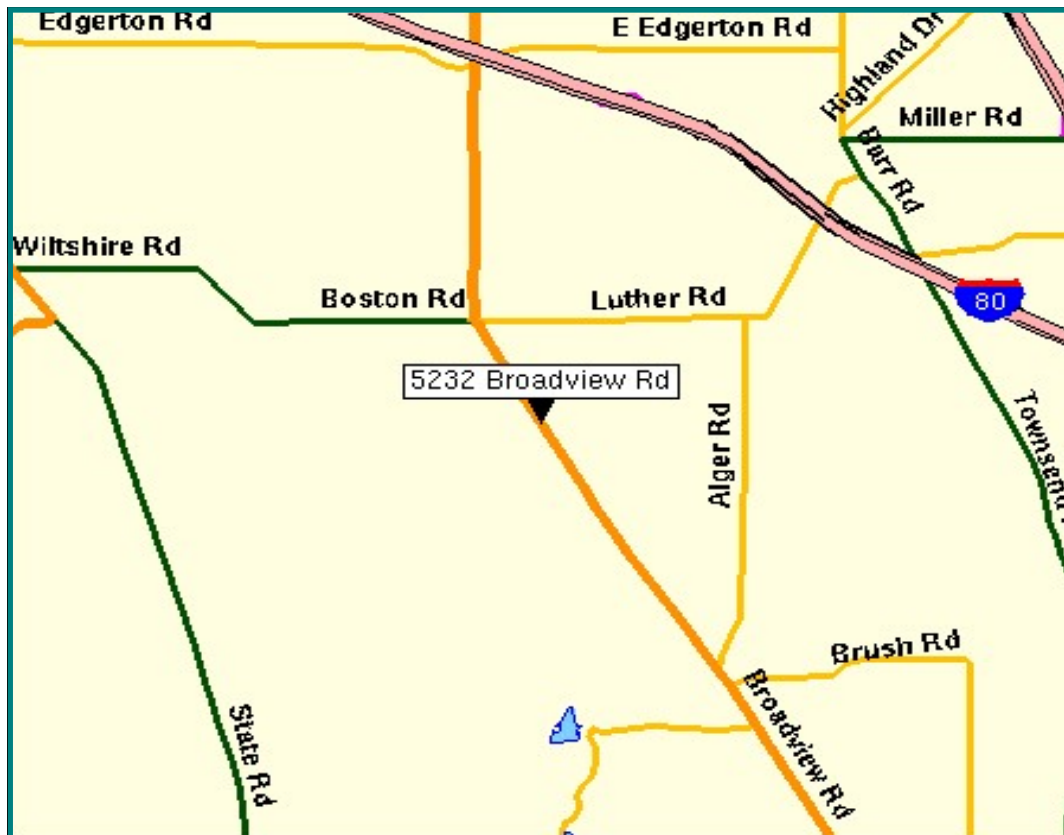

XX9D - 45,000 QSOs from Macau by Werner Hasemann DJ9KH

As we were sitting together at the pool in Sri Lanka last year we tried to find an answer to the question foremost in every expedition planner member's mind: Where do we go next?

Our team members preferred Pacific destinations in the past but had to accept that propagations on short-wave will slow down the next 5 to 7 years. A successful expedition with a moderate number of QSOs could then only be made from locations closer to the radio amateur hot spots of Europe, Japan and North America. At last we found, that Macau would be an attractive spot being as it was on several Most Wanted Lists and offering the chance to have pile-ups around the clock.



Macau as the next target was accepted by the team and preparations began with collecting information: What about the last expeditions to Macau, who could be helpful for us in Macau, what did we learn during our last activities on the Marshall Islands and Sri Lanka? We found DL8LE, PG5M, IK7YTT and XX8LT (Bom) as Macau-insiders with actual experience of Macau. They supported us with information and connected us and our needs to the management of the Grand Coloane Resort hotel, which responded in a very obliging manner.

At an early stage the hotel management and we made provisions as far as possible for the specific circumstances and challenges facing us. For example: special constructions to hold the bases of our 5 masts on the floor of the balconies could be machined in advance, the extra booked operating room on the top floor could be equipped after our wishes a.s.o. .

The hot phase of planning began after we got the "green light" from the telecommunication authorities in Macau, including the callsign XX9D . Our key considerations were: 24/7 operation with 10 operators and 3-4 active stations, 4 K3 transceivers plus 500 watt amplifiers ; 5 antennas for 160m

to 10 meters, 2 bandfilters for each band, a 1.5 kW Triplexer, common-mode and ac-filters, low-loss cables....all under the dictate of minimizing the weight of the luggage.

We had a very comfortable flight from Frankfurt via Beijing to Macau where we found ourselves at the customs-gate having to decide: declare or nothing to declare. We asked the friendly staff for an import declaration for our transceivers. It took quite some time to assure them that we needed such a declaration. At last they confiscated the transceivers and asked us to pick them up the next day with the necessary papers.

Anyway, 2 hours later we arrived at the hotel, the Grand Coloane Resorta real 5-star hotel. Unpacking was done in a short time and antenna mounting began. Thanks to the detailed advance information



regarding the hotel and the surrounding area, setting up the 5 masts with their antennas including the guying, matching and tuning took us only about 6 hours the next day. In the meantime the transceivers and the licenses were picked up downtown and we were ready for the PTT- inspection team. 3 friendly officials were interested to see all the equipment and antennas we had put up. After a few questions we had a big OK for our operation.

The team around the `chief` Rolf DL7VEE consisted of 10 expedition-proven operators from Germany plus Bom XX9LT from Macau, who visited us almost daily and was integrated into the operations-plan. He was by far the youngest member of a crew with an average age of 67 .

The first shift began with RU4LM as the first QSO on 17m CW. Day and night 4.5 hour shifts with 3 to 4 active stations. 30/40/80/160m during the night, the higher bands of course during the day-time. Conditions on 40 and 80m were much better than expected, 160m with more than 1000 QSOs gave us a lot of fun around sunrise, although we would have been able to have even more fun with a special receiving-antenna on 160 as well as on 80m. We had vertical antennas for 30-40-80 and 160 meters, delta-loop antennas for 12 and 17 meters and a hex-beam for 10 to 20 meters. All in all the antennas performed well.



Thanks to the double-filter strategy we had no interaction between the active stations. Also we

had no problems with noise from the hotel-installations to speak of. Unfortunately some of the high-power filters failed, possibly leading to the failure of one of the K3s which happened around the same time. A day later one of our KPA 500 amplifiers gave up. Elecraft in California sent us the necessary spare parts and a few days later we were able to run full power with all 4 stations again. The daily QSO-rates led us to our first goal of 30.000 QSO which we easily exceeded in the end with around 45,000 QSOs whereof 65% were in CW, 18% in RTTY and 17% in SSB.

The part of the worldwide amateur radio community hardest to reach from Macau is North America, nevertheless we were able to have more than 3000 QSOs with North America, almost 1000 on



160/80/40m. Sadly that we had to read some comments in our guest book with complaints about our working style. I am very sure, that we did our best under the special circumstances with propagations far below that we used to have the last 10 years. Thank heavens we were residing in a 5-star hotel which boasted a fantastic restaurant, a pool area and a very friendly and helpful staff. Best conditions for recreation after a strenuous shift or a (sometimes) frustrating night on the lowbands."

All in all we left Macau in a good mood and satisfied that we performed quite well, specially on the low bands. As promised in our publications the OQRS and LoTW uploads are done in the meantime, the paper QSLs are printed. Have a look on our homepage www.xx9d.mydx.de.

A big "Thank You" to all our sponsors worldwide, they really made this expedition affordable for the team members and we are sure we didn't disappoint them.

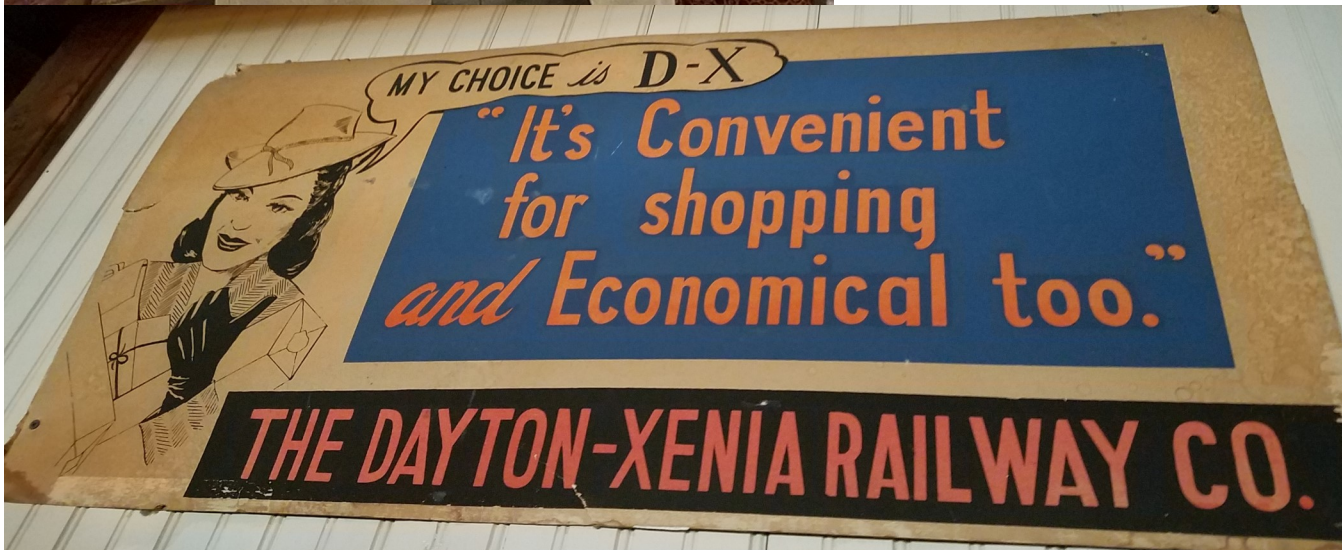

Morsum Magnificat now available for free download by Dan Romanchik, KB6NU

I forget exactly how this came to my attention., but being the CW geek that I am, I had to put this on my blog. Back issues of *Morsum Magnificat*, a delightfully homebrew magazine—what many of us called a 'zine, back in the day—are now available online. Issue nr 1 of the English version, pictured at right, features articles on Jack Sykes, who, at the time was purported to be the last manufacturer of code keys in Britain; a transistorized sidetone oscillator to monitor a CW transmitter's keying; and many other stories and news items about both landline and radio telegraphy. Please enjoy them.



Morsum Magnificat now available for free download

The English language edition of *Morsum Magnificat*, the Morse Magazine, otherwise known as "MM", contained a vast amount of information and illustrations of interest to Morse operators, key collectors, historians, researchers and other Morse enthusiasts.

Published from 1986 to 2004, in 89 issues, with readers and contributors around the world, it covered every conceivable aspect of Morse telegraphy, past, present and future, in a truly international way.

With the permission of the copyright holder, Zyg Nilski, G3OKD, this vast resource is now available for download in PDF format, free of charge, thanks to the generosity of Lynn Burlingame N7CFO who was a reader of, and contributor to, MM.

Included in the downloads is an updated and revised version of the MM 54-page Key WT 8 Amp Worldwide Survey which has proved to be of great interest to both users and collectors of the many versions of this famous pre-war, wartime and post-war military Morse key.

MM was first published in the Dutch language, by Morse enthusiasts, Rinus Hellemons PA0BFN, and Dick Kraayveld PA3ALM. They were later joined by Tony Smith G4FAI who helped them launch the English language edition of the magazine.

After Rinus died, G4FAI produced and edited MM alone until he was joined by Geoff Arnold G3GSR, one-time editor of *Practical Wireless* and founder of *Radio Bygones*. Later, Zyg Nilski G3OKD took over as editor and produced the final 28 issues of the magazine.

Original readers of MM who have copies missing from their collection can now fill the gap with a digital download. Today's newcomers, and those who missed it first time round, now have the opportunity to discover what this unique publication has to offer them, and it



costs nothing!

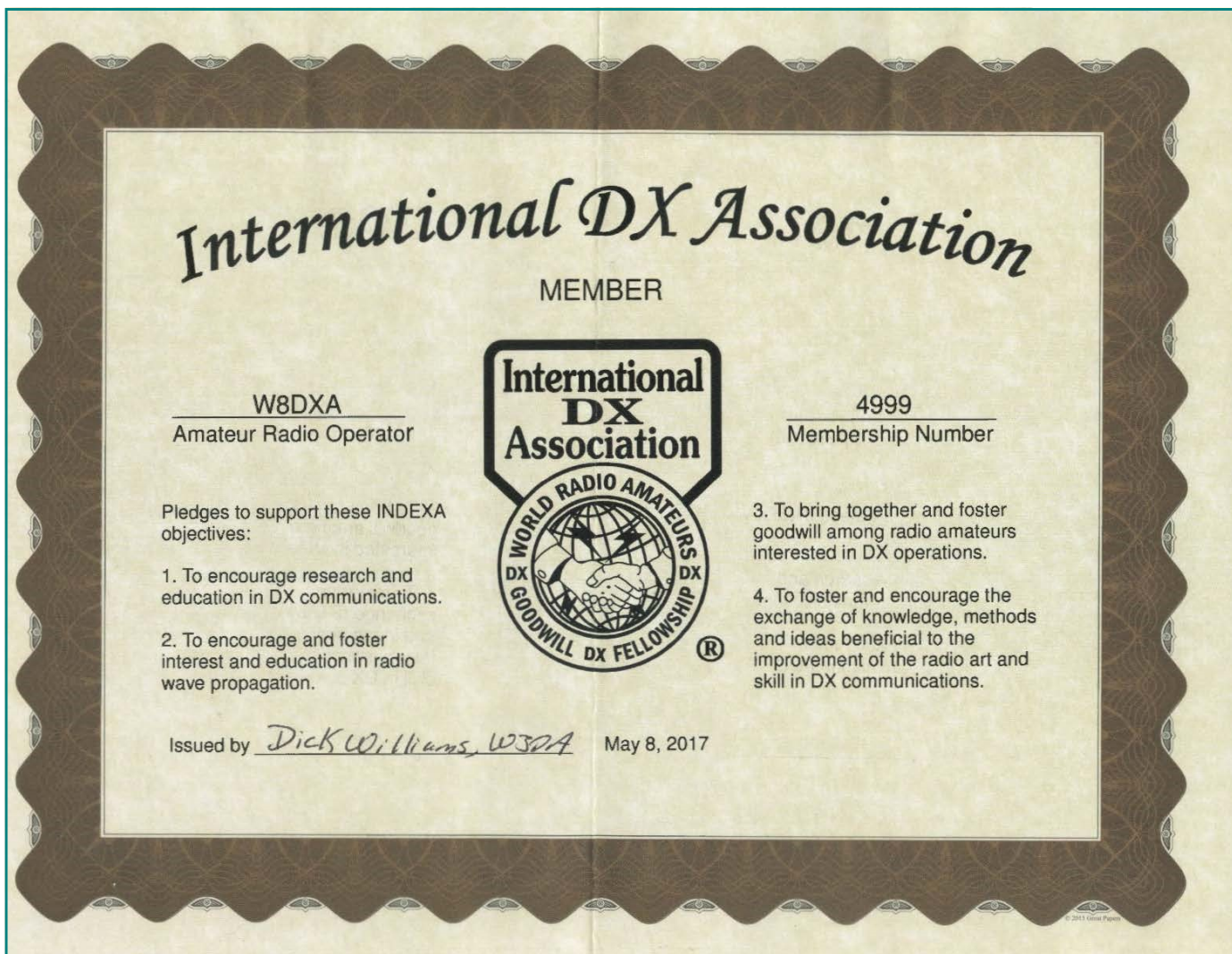
But the older McCullough can deal with that in exchange for the girls sharing his passion for ham

Flash! DX News!

So, where do YOU get your DX news? At one time, in the "good old days of DXing," this column (and others like it) was pretty much the only source for DX information. Then, along came some weekly "paper mailed" newsletters like the West Coast DX Bulletin, The DX Bulletin, QRZ-DX, etc. Today, with the internet, times have changed. I will not be "announcing" many DX operations on these pages mainly since I write this column almost two months prior to publication. What I can do is pass along some decent DX resources that are available to you online. There are so many resources out there! It all depends on your level of enthusiasm for chasing DX. The more traditional method might be subscribing to a DX news bulletin. Some are free. Some are not.

If you are only looking to keep up-to-date on a weekly basis with limited detail, might I suggest The OPDX Bulletin, which is done by Tedd Mirgliotta, KB8NW. It's weekly. It's complete. It's free. It includes access to the last 17 years of issues and promises a search engine so you will be able to research those old issues more quickly. It is "info" only. No pretty pictures. It includes the important information like dates of activities, QSL routes, etc. He also occasionally puts out a special bulletin when appropriate in order to update current info. The web page is <<http://www.papays.com/opdx.html>>. Tedd has been doing a super job on this, and kudos for keeping it free.

The ARRL provides a free DX Bulletin weekly. These are somewhat condensed, and are mainly comprised of more current activity. W1AW bulletins are currently available via email. Receiving W1AW bulletins via email is easy for ARRL Members: Go to your online member profile <<http://www.arrl.org/myarrl>> and select the categories of bulletins you wish to receive. **Non-ARRL members** can also receive W1AW bulletins via email. Send an email message to <w1aw-list-request@arrl.org>. **Subject:** Subscribe [your email address] **To unsubscribe**, send an email message to the same address with the **Subject:** Unsubscribe [your email address].

A European-based DX Mailing list is the 425DX News edited by Mauro (I1JQJ) and Valeria (IK1ADH) Preglasco. Subscription to the 425 DX News email mailing list is free and you can unsubscribe whenever you want. You will receive only the message posted by the editors and the administrators (i.e. 425 DX News Bulletins, IOTA Notices, and other DX information of interest). This is not a reflector, so you will be unable to post messages of your own. Subscribe to mailing List at: <<http://groups.google.com/group/425eng/>>.

If you need — or would like — more detailed DX information, then may I suggest a few resources

that charge for their service? For a daily email update on DX operations, I'd suggest "The Daily DX" by Bernie McCienny, W3UR. Bernie offers a variety of subscriptions. "The Daily DX" keeps you up-to-date with daily email bulletins. If something comes up suddenly, special news flashes are sent to subscribers. His "Weekly DX" subscription offers a PDF newsletter. Bernie's website has some free links for info as well as a free trial for the Daily DX. Go to <www.dailydx.com> for more information.

Another very reliable source for DX news is DX Publishing, Inc., run by my predecessor as editor of this column, Carl Smith, N4AA. Carl puts out a weekly newsletter, "QRZ DX," which is available in paper "mailed" format, or via email (my recommendation). Email subscribers will get "SPECIAL BULLETINS" as warranted between regular issues. Carl also publishes the bi-monthly (every other month) DX Magazine. It includes more in-depth stories and plenty of photos. For complete info including samples, please go to <www.dxpub.com>.

If you just want to "click a link" to see what's happening online, there are numerous additional resources out there. I may not be complete here, so if I miss any worthwhile resources, I welcome your input and I will add them to future DX columns. Might I suggest bookmarking these and before setting in to chase some DX, click on a few. In no particular order:
